High School Transition

Students must ensure that they have all the necessary items to participate: swimmers, towel, sunscreen and goggles all in a suitable bag for carrying wet clothes. Please ensure that all items are clearly named. Thongs can be worn to and from the pool. Participation is essential unless students have a medical note explaining why they can't participate.

I would like to thank the P & C for their financial support of this program which will benefit all students. The cost of the lessons is nil as it is covered by Sporting Schools funding, the P&C and the school.

Screen time and screen use are a normal part of life for most children and teenagers. The time your child spends watching TV and using computers, gaming consoles, tablets and smartphones can be part of a healthy lifestyle. While there is no 'hour limit' for school aged students, make sure children balance screen time with other physical activities and use quality digital media. Some programs such as Fortnite have age restrictions so are not suitable for children under the age of 12 years. I think the consensus is that parents need to monitor what their children are watching or playing and how much time they are spending in front of screens.




in the classrooms?

3/4 News

This week we will be continuing to learn more about poetic devices as part of our poetry unit. 3/4 will investigating the use of onomatopoeia in poems and will be exploring how to use this in their imaginative writing.

During whole class writing activities, we have been focusing on the structure of imaginative stories and using more descriptive language to share with the reader personal qualities of characters and more information about the stories setting. Students have been experimenting by writing from different perspectives and points of view to engage the reader. We will continue focusing on these techniques this week.

3/4 will be challenging themselves with their recall of multiples of 4 and solving number problems involving money. We will also complete activities based on fractions and decimals.






