The artworks then become part of the Children's Hospital at Westmead's permanent collection.



2026 selective high school and opportunity class applications

There are changes to the application and placement process for both selective high schools (SHS) and opportunity classes (OC). Tests will mostly be hosted in external centres, reducing the burden on schools, and conducted on computers delivering a more engaging experience for students. There is also a longer application period for parents and carers to apply.

The application period for both OC and SHS is now the same and will run from 7 November 2024 to 21 February 2025. Due to the longer application period, late applications won't be accepted.

With the new application period, parents and carers can now apply for OC placement when their child is at the end of Year 3 or at the start of Year 4, and for SHS placement at the end of Year 5 or at the start of Year 6. The 2025 test dates are from 2 to 4 May 2025. Students will need to attend one test date

School Excellence Plan – Feedback

The school staff are currently developing a new School Excellence Plan (SEP) replacing the Strategic Improvement Plan (SIP) 2021-2024. The new SEP will guide school improvements for 2025 – 2028.

Strategic Direction 2: Impactful High-Quality Teaching

Strategic Direction 3: Strengthening Wellbeing Practices

• Initiative 1: Learning Culture

A new Context Statement was also drafted and was shown to the P&C for feedback.

Goolgowi Public School, situated on Wiradjuri Lands, is a small rural and remote school located mid-way between Griffith and Hillston in the Shire of Carrathool in the North-West Riverina. It is at the crossroads of the Mid-Western Highway and Kidman Way.

The school provides high-quality education for students drawn from both farming areas and students who live in the small village of Goolgowi. The school is the focal point of the community and caters for students from Kindergarten to Year 6. Our student population fluctuates, and we are currently planning for 38 students in 2025, 25% of whom are Aboriginal.



Goolgowi Public School has a proactive and dedicated parent body in its Parents and Citizens Association (P&C) and the school has developed strong relationships within the wider community.

The school embraces the values of 'Respect, Responsibility and Resilience' and adheres to Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL) which contributes to a positive learning environment. We recognise the relationship between wellbeing and learning and take a collective responsibility for our students.

dedicated staff engage with stakeholders to foster a school-wide culture of high expectations, learning, development and success to ensure all students are known, valued and cared for. There is a strong focus on catering for the individual needs of students through differentiated teaching and learning programs specific support and enrichment programs, including High Potential and Education (HPGE). Staff pride themselves on providing a wide range of educational experiences and there is sustained and strong emphasis on literacy and numeracy.

Consultation and feedback regularly take place with students, staff and families through group and individual discussions to assist with our strategic planning process and to determine the areas of focus for the School Excellence Plan (SEP). It is important to note this SEP builds on previous school plans.

We have been practising our Presentation Night's percussion item like mad. If you



come to the school just before the home bell on Wednesdays, you'll hear K-2 students practising in the library. We've been right through the whole piece already and the only person still making consistent mistakes is the conductor (me).

A recent highlight was the excursion to Griffith City Cinemas last Wednesday, to see The Wild Robot movie.

The movie did a great job in pointing out the power of persistent kindness in forming new relationships. We had time to eat and play at the City Park in Griffith, which is where the photos with this note are from.



Relationships are rarely smooth sailing for anyone and this term, the Child Protection focus is on Personal Safety. We want the children to know that they have a degree of responsibility in recognising and responding to safe and unsafe social or environmental situations. Students are being encouraged to become more aware of their feelings and how their body reacts, as an indicator of a safe or unsafe situation. For example, a child may feel very nervous if asked to do something dangerous by a friend and their body's signal might be that they start breathing very quickly.

With the end of the year fast approaching, I have been doing quite a bit of assessment to see how students have progressed. In general, I am pleased with most children's academic progress. I am particularly pleased with the improvements by some students in social areas and in their confidence to work independently.

As I drive home from Griffith on Tuesday nights, I see the lights of combine harvesters, as farmers work the long hours that go with harvest time. All the best to those of you on farms. Hopefully, the rain won't interfere too much more.

3-6 News

Week 5 and another assembly week! We look forward to seeing many of you on Friday. Stage 2 and 3 have been learning a well-known poem by Banjo Patterson called 'The Man from Ironbark.' They are looking forward to presenting this at the assembly.

This week we marked Remembrance Day with a small school assembly where we commemorated the loss of Australian lives from all wars and conflicts. As in all public schools, it is an opportunity when students reflect about the privilege of living in a country like Australia. They were given the opportunity to pay their respects to the substantial number of soldiers who died in battle to give us the freedom we enjoy today by laying poppies under the flagpoles.

Last week, the whole school travelled to Griffith City Cinemas for our excursion. On the way, the students enjoyed eating lunch and recess at City Park. It was an opportunity for them to have longer play and have access to different play equipment. The inventive games and squeals of delight as stages interacted was great to witness.



We viewed, 'The Wild Robot' written by Peter Browne. This movie was based on the novel 'The Wild Robot' that Stage 3 read together in Term 4. Shipwrecked on a deserted island, a robot named Roz must learn to adapt to its new surroundings. Building relationships with the native animals, Roz soon develops a parental bond with an orphaned gosling. As Roz studies her environment, she learns everything she needs to know. She learns how to move through the wilderness, how to avoid danger, she even learns how communicate with the animals. But the most important lesson Roz learns is that kindness can be a survival skill. Peter Brown opens a whole new world with themes of bullvina friendship, family, and others. This importantly helping touches on themes of survival, community and belonging.





It's interesting that these themes keep reoccurring. In our Child Development lessons we're also discussing the importance of relationships. What makes ones that we are attracted to and ones that we should avoid. Trust and kindness are two words that the students have repeated are important to them.

Golf is the sport activity for Term 4. The students have been practising their driving skills. You'd be amazed at the determination and distance they achieve when they 'whack' the ball. They drive the ball a great distance down the 'intended fairway' towards the 'intended green' so much so, that retrieving the ball is sometimes a costly and timely exercise.




