Principal's Message

We are looking forward to welcoming the students, teachers and parents from Rankins Springs who will be joining us for the Cross Country Carnival on Friday 17 May. The P&C will be running a canteen with a BBQ lunch and drinks, cakes and slices and coffee and tea. We invite and encourage all parents and carers to attend and will be seeking some assistance from parents / carers on the day to be at check points, to be timekeepers and to help set up and pack away equipment. We are all looking forward to this event..... with 'Team Work makes the Dream Work'. Any parental assistance will be greatly appreciated.

School Bytes App

I encourage and recommend that all parents have the School Bytes App on their phone. This App is the main form of communication for parents / carers. If you are unsure how to install it on your phone our friendly P&C or Jane in the school office will be more than happy to help.

Reading Club

A BIG great job to all students who are participating in our Reading Club. The club is to encourage students to read regularly and for those students to be rewarded and acknowledged for their good reading habits. The Reading Club operates simultaneously with the Premier's Reading Challenge (PRC). The key differences between the programs are that the Reading Club encourages reading on a daily basis and the PRC encourages students to read a certain number of books. Also, the PRC stops in August and the Reading Club continues throughout the year and continues throughout the school holidays and over the weekend. Books read for the PRC can be used for the Reading Clun as well. Each time a student reads for 25 days they will be rewarded at the morning assembly with a bookmark award. Students who read for 200

days in the year will be rewarded with a certificate at the annual presentation day assembly and be part of the "200 Club".

Wide reading for children and regular practice are fundamental pillars in fostering strong literacy skills and overall cognitive development. what is wide reading? Reading many kinds of books is called "wide" reading. Students who do this "wide" reading are exposed to more words, different kinds of pictures and text formats. and whole new worlds! Next time you do some reading with your child, instead of traditional fiction, try some non-fiction texts. As adults, we read non-fiction throughout the day to learn how to complete tasks, to catch up on the latest headline news, and to solve problems. The standardised tests that students take each year also have a lot of non-fiction text. Students need to know how to attack this kind of reading. Take time to look at the captions, table-of-contents, glossary, bold-print and headings in the Other non-fiction text informative texts, biographies, instructions, procedures and brochures Have your child help read the directions for a game. Read the steps to putting his or her new toy together. Read a recipe and follow the directions while you cook together! The options are endless for this kind of text!

Remember to bring your Reading Folder to school every day!

New English and Mathematics Syllabus

This year the 3-6 grades are learning from the new English and mathematics syllabus. Students in K-2 started with the new syllabus last year. There are some key differences with the old and new syllabus. A strong, systematic, and explicit reading focus is a key component of the new K-2 and 3-6 English Syllabus. Students in the early years are explicitly taught phonics and phonological awareness.

Phonological awareness is a critical skill for all students' literacy development and a predictor of later reading and spelling success. Phonological awareness refers to oral language and is the understanding of the different ways that language can be broken down into smaller parts. Phonological awareness consists of five subskills beginning with word, syllable, onset/rime awareness, moving to the more complex subskills of basic and advanced phonemic awareness.

Phonics is the relationship between printed letters and the sounds they represent. The reader must understand that words are made up of phonemes or units of sound. instruction Phonics connects phonemes with written letters so that the reader can transfer knowledge of sounds to the printed word. Students need to learn to blend together phonemes to read words. The goal of phonics instruction is to help readers quickly determine the sounds in unfamiliar written words. When readers encounter new words in texts, they use the elements of phonics to decode understand. Further information about the syllabus will be included in each newsletter.

Attendance

Our school continues to have high attendance rates: above the State average and above the Griffith network of schools' average. Currently our school attendance rate is sitting at 94.2% with the state average being 86.9%. We are hoping to improve this percentage further and encourage all students to attend every day.



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
